Crime in McAllen provides an overview of Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) by the McAllen Police Department. This report examines offenses and total volume of UCR offenses that occurred in 2013.

The McAllen Police Department continues to use statistical resources by collecting, analyzing crime trends, carefully planning strategic operations, and administrative operational functions of the Department, that are used for preventing and suppressing criminal activities.

In addition, effective strategies helped our department pinpoint crime issues, which enabled us to address problems and to direct resources where needed the most.

INTRODUCTION

The City of McAllen Police Department participates in the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program. Uniform Crime Reporting is part of nationwide, cooperative statistical effort administered by the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

History of UCR

In the 1920s, the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) recognized the potential value in tracking national crime statistics. The Committee on Uniform Crime Records of the IACP developed and initiated this voluntary national data collection effort in 1930. Also, in 1930 the IACP was instrumental in gaining congressional approval which authorized the FBI to serve as the national clearinghouse for statistical information on crime. In June 1966, the National Sheriffs' Association (NSA) established a Committee on Uniform Crime Reporting to serve in an advisory capacity and to encourage sheriffs throughout the country to fully participate in the Program. Since 1930, through the UCR Program, the FBI has collected and compiled data to use in law enforcement administration, operation, management, and to indicate fluctuations in the level of crime in America.

To best depict total crime and to provide the most meaningful data to police administrators, the UCR Program collects data on known offenses and persons arrested by law enforcement agencies. The UCR Program does not record the findings of a court, coroner, jury, or the decision of a prosecutor.

UCR collects reports of seven index crimes. The crimes in this group are all serious, either by their nature or because of the frequency with which they occur. These seven index crimes are:

- Murder
- Forcible rape
- Robbery
- Aggravated Assaults
- Burglary
- **♦** Larceny (theft)
- Motor Vehicle Theft

The above chart lists the Crime Volume and Crime Rate for the City of McAllen. The "rate" reflects the number of crimes reported per 100,000 residents.

CRIME TRENDS & ANALYSIS

- ☐ Crime trends are analyzed using two methods, Crime Volume and Crime Rates.
- ☐ Crimes are also categorized according to: Violent Crimes and Property Crimes.

CRIME VOLUME:

Volume is the collective sum of the seven index crimes. By comparing the volume of index crimes from year to year; trends can be evaluated.

CRIME RATES:

Crime rates on the other hand, are compiled to compensate for the changes in population and to show the number of people affected by crime in a given population. Crime rates are usually expressed in the number of crimes per 100,000 residents.

VIOLENT CRIMES:

Involve the element of personal confrontation between the perpetrator and the victim. This category is comprised of Homicide, Forcible Rape, Robbery, and Aggravated Assault.

PROPERTY CRIMES:

Involve only the taking of money or property. This category is comprised of Burglary, Theft, and Motor Vehicle Theft.

- During the calendar year 2013, McAllen's crime rate was 4035.1 crimes per 100,000 persons. The crime rate decreased 2.8percent.


UCR INDEX CRIMES 2013

INDEX CRIME VOLUME

- The average monthly crime volume is 466.
- The highest monthly crime volume recorded was August with 504 offenses reported.
- 2013 experienced a 0.6% decrease compared to 2012.
- Murder experienced a 100% increase in 2013 when compared to 2012.
- October was the lowest month with a crime volume of 385 offenses recorded.
- Reductions were recorded in two of the seven index crimes during 2013.

INDEX CRIME RATE


- The average monthly crime rate is 336.
- Rape experienced a 95.7% crime rate increase when compared to 2012.
- Motor Vehicle Theft rate experienced an increase of 9.4 % compared to 2012.
- Robbery experienced a 45.0% rate increase in 2013 when compared to 2012.
- Murder had the lowest crime rate for 2013 with 1.4.
- Property Crimes recorded 2.9 percent rate reduction compared to 2012.



ANNUAL CRIME TRENDS


VIOLENT CRIMES

Violent Crimes involve the element of personal confrontation between the perpetrator and the victim. Because of nature, violent crimes are considered to be more serious than property crimes. An estimated 171 violent crimes occurred during 2013. A 3% increase from 2012.




PROPERTY CRIMES

The number of property crimes occurring during 2013 was estimated at 5424. Property crimes decreased by 0.8 percent. Theft accounted for 86 percent compared to motor vehicle theft with 4 percent. The property crime rate was 3911.8 for 2013.



Monthly crime variations show that in general crime occurrences peaked in the month of August with a total of 504 crimes reported. The lowest month of reported crime for 2013 was in October with 385 Part 1 crimes reported. (See figure: 3)

This is an aggregate representation of UCR data, it is designed to convey the annual reported crime experience by showing the relative frequency of occurrence of the Index Offenses.

McAllen Crime Facts at a Glance 2013

- ➤ There were an estimated 5595 index offenses. The Crime rate for the City of McAllen was 4035.1 index offenses per 100,000 habitants.
- ➤ During 2013, McAllen Police made 6023 arrests. Of those arrested, 658 were 17 years of age or younger.
- > The value of stolen property totaled \$5,559,472.03
- ➤ There was an estimated 80 Aggravated assaults. Of these, 35 percent were committed with the use of firearms.
- ➤ Residential burglaries accounted for 64% of all burglaries reported.
- ➤ The estimated number of motor vehicle thefts were 236, for a total dollar loss \$2,564,294.
- ➤ In 2013, larceny/theft victims suffered losses totaling \$3,726,237.54


Chapter Two Index Crime Analysis

CRIMINAL HOMICIDE

MURDER /NON-NEGLIGENT MANSLAUGHTER

DEFINITION

Murder and non-negligent manslaughter, as defined in the UCR program, is the willful killing of one human being by another. This offense category includes any death resulting from a fight, argument, quarrel, assault or commission of a crime. Attempted murder and assaults with the intent to kill are not counted as murder, but are included in UCR as aggravated assaults. Suicides, accidental deaths, and justifiable homicides are also excluded from the murder classification.



The McAllen Police Department participates in UCR providing additional information so that an in-depth analysis of murder is possible. Through Supplement Homicide Reporting System, information is provided that identifies the age, sex, race, and ethnic origin of both victim and offender; the murder weapon; and the circumstance of the offense.

RATE


There were 2 murders reported during 2013.

The murders occurred in the month of February and August . (See figure: 4)

During 2013 the murder volume was approximately 100% more than in 2012.


The murder rate for McAllen in 2013 was 1.4 murders committed for every 100,000 persons.

The murder rate increased by 95.7% from 2012.




OFFENSES BY MONTH

During 2013, the day of the week being Sunday and Saturday recorded the number of murders. (See figure:6)




LOCATIONS


In 2013 murder victims age was 55-59 and 60-65 years of age.




Victim's ethnicity was Hispanic. (See figure:10)

OFFENDERS

For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, an offense is cleared only when law enforcement agency has identified the offender, enough evidence exists to press charges, and the subject is actually taken into custody.

The arrests of one person can clear several crimes or several persons maybe arrested in the process of clearing one offense. Law enforcement agencies may also clear a crime by exceptional means when some element beyond law enforcement control precludes the placing of formal charges against the offender.

OFFENDERS AGE


Offenders age range was 30-34 and unknown. (See figure: 12)


OFFENDERS GENDER


Based on the information relating to murder offender it can be determined that 50 percent of offenders age in 2013 was unknown. (See figure:13).

Offender's ethnicity accounted for 50 percent unknown and 50 percent Hispanic. (See figure: 14).








RELATIONSHIP

In addition, it can be inferred from the data complied, that one case the victim was related to the offender.


WEAPON

FORCIBLE RAPE


DEFINITION

Rape, as defined in the Uniform Crime Reporting Program, is the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. Carnal knowledge is defined by Black's Law Dictionary (9thed) as, "the act of a man having sexual bodily connections with a woman; sexual intercourse".

"Against her will" include instances in which victim is incapable of giving consent because of her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity (or because of her youth). The ability of the victim to give consent must be a professional determination by the law enforcement agency.

Reporting agencies must classify rapes or attempted rape, accomplished by force or threat of force, as forcible regardless of the age of the female victim.

Statistics reported in this crime category include assaults to commit forcible rape, however, statutory rape (rape against a female under the age of consent) and sexual assaults on males are excluded.



VOLUME


There were 6 rapes reported during 2013. This represents a increase of 100 percent when compared to 2012.

Rapes occurred in January, April, May and July . (Please see figure:17)

RATE

The rape rate for McAllen was 4.3 rapes per 100,000 persons.

The rape rate increased by 95.7 percent when compared to 2012.



VICTIMOLOGY

Forcible Rape differs from other violent crimes because, in many cases, the victims are hesitant to report the offense to the police. The rigors of court procedures, embarrassment, and fear of any accompanying stigma exert a deterrent effect upon the victim's willingness to contact the police. As attitudes towards the reporting of rape change, trends in the number of reported offenses can be expected to change accordingly.

Data compiled during 2013 shows that there were 6 victims.

VICTIMS BY AGE GROUP

Rape victims range from all age groups.

Within these age groups, the age group that were reported the highest incidents was the 10-14 age group, with 2 incidents. (See figure:18)


The lowest number of victims age group reported was the under 10, 15-19,25-29 and 40-44 age group with 1.




Of the six rapes reported in 2013, 67% were juveniles. (See figure: 19)

OFFENDER BY AGE GROUP


Offenders range from all age groups. Within these age groups, the age group that reported the highest number of offenders was the 20-24 age group, with 2 incidents. (See figure: 21)


OFFENDER BY AGE TYPE


Offenders reported for rape were all adults. (See figure: 22)

The offenders for the rape category also demonstrated to be 100% Hispanic. (See figure: 23)








LOCATION OF CRIME

ROBBERY

DEFINITION

Robbery is the taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

Robbery is a vicious type of theft in that it is committed in the presence of the victim. The victim, who usually is the owner or person having custody of the property, is directly confronted by the perpetrator and is threatened with force or is put in fear that force will be used. Robbery involves a theft or larceny but is aggravated by the element of force or threat of force.

Injury to the victim during the commission of this violent crime is frequent.

The following figure illustrates the data collection for the nature and extent of the Robbery Category.



VOLUME

The total number of robberies reported during 2013, was 83.

The month of July reported the highest number of robberies, with 12 reported.


During 2013 the robbery volume was 83 approximately 48.2 increase than in 2012.

The **lowest** months with robberies were in February and April with only 3 robberies reported.

RATE

The robbery rate for McAllen in 2013 was 59.9 robberies for every 100,000 persons.

The change in the rate of robbery from 2012 was an increase of 45.0 %.



ANALYSIS

NATURE

During 2013, property loss during the commission of robberies amounted to \$ 278,550. (See table: 3)

The month with the highest property loss reported was in July with a reported \$ 75,410.


The month with the lowest loss was February with \$0 of losses being reported from the commission of a robbery.


LOCATION

Of all reported robberies in 2013 "Highway" and "Commercial" accounted for 33 percent and "Other" accounted for 19 percent of the offenses in this category.

According to the data compiled, robbery at "Convenience Stores" accounted for 14 % of incidents reported.






PERSONS ARRESTED


During 2013, a total of 52 persons were arrested for robbery.

Of the persons arrested for robbery, 94% were male and 6% were female. (See figure: 27)



TYPE OF WEAPON

The weapon most frequently used to commit a robbery was the use of firearm which accounted for 44% of incidents while the "other category" was used 35% and knife/cutting instrument accounted for 11%. (See figure:28)



AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

DEFINITION

Aggravated assault, as per the Uniform Crime Reporting Program is an unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm.

Aggravated assaults are classified into four different categories:

- (1) Assault with firearm
- (2) Assault with knife or cutting instrument
- (3) Assault with other dangerous weapon
- (4) Assault using strong-arm tactics



VOLUME

RATE

During 2013, a total of 80 aggravated assaults were reported.


The average monthly volume for aggravated assaults was 7.

The highest month recorded on aggravated assaults was March with 12 offenses reported.

The lowest aggravated assault volume was recorded in February with 1 offenses.

The number of aggravated assaults committed in 2013 were 80. This represents a 24.5% decrease from 2012.

The aggravated assault rate for McAllen in 2013 was 57.7 per 100,000 persons. The rate decreased 26.2 percent from 2012.



ANALYSIS

NATURE

During 2013, a total of 80 aggravated assaults were reported. A significant decrease compared to 106 reported in 2012.

WEAPON USED

Aggravated assaults are classified into four different categories: (1) Assault with firearm,

- (2) Assault with knife or cutting instrument,
- (3) Assault with other dangerous weapon, and
- (4) Assault using strong-arm tactics.

During 2013 the most frequently used weapon in the commission of an aggravated assault was in "knife or cutting instrument" category with 47% reported. Firearm category with 35% and the Other dangerous weapon with 18% this category includes, but is not limited to: clubs, bricks, tire irons, bottles, or other blunt objects.




The use or attempted use of a dangerous weapon in an assault or the serious injury inflicted by hands, fists, or feet is what separates this index offense from the assault categorized as "simple assaults".

PERSONS ARRESTED

McAllen Law Enforcement Officers arrested 75 people for aggravated assaults in 2013. Of the 75 perpetrators arrested, 63 were adults and 12 were juveniles.


BURGLARY

DEFINITION

Burglary for Uniform Crime Reporting purposes is the unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft. Burglary can be classified as forcible entry, unlawful entry (no force) or attempted forcible entry. While the use of force to gain entry is not required to classify an offense as burglary, attempted forcible entries to commit burglary are counted in this crime's statistics.

The Uniform Crime Reporting program's definition of structure includes, but is not limited, to an apartment, barn, cabin, church, condominium, dwelling house, factory, garage, house trailer, office, school, railroad car and other buildings.

Additionally, any house trailer or other mobile unit that is permanently fixed as an office, residence, or storehouse is considered a structure.



VOLUME

During 2013, there were 536 burglaries reported in the City of McAllen. The average monthly volume for 2013 is 44.

This represents a 6.6% increase when compared to 503 burglaries reported in 2012.


The highest volume reported was in July with 56 burglaries reported.

The lowest volume reported was in the month of February with 32 burglaries reported.

RATE

The 2013 burglary rate was 386.6 burglaries for every 100,000 persons.

The change in the burglary rate from 2012, shows a increase of 4.3%.




ANALYSIS

The most common entry for burglary was forcible entry, which accounted for 67 percent and non-forcible accounted for 33 percent. Of the number of burglaries 195 were residential and 341 were non- residential.


Total property loss reported for burglary was \$ 1,718,744.46. (See table 4)


Offenders age ranged from 10-61+ years of age. Of the 536 burglaries, 146 were cleared by arrest.

LARCENY (THEFT)


DEFINITION

Larceny/Theft, in the Uniform Crime Reporting program, is the unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. Larceny/Theft includes crimes such as shoplifting, pocket-picking, purse snatching, thefts from motor vehicles, theft of motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, and other things of value in which no use of force, violence or fraud occurs.

In the UCR program, this crime classification does not include embezzlement, "con" games, forgery, and the passing of worthless checks. Motor vehicle theft is not included in this category as it is a separate index crime offense.

Larceny can be sub-classified into 9 different categories:

- Pocket Picking
- Purse Snatching
- Shoplifting
- Theft from Motor Vehicle
- ❖Theft from Vehicle Parts
- ❖ Theft of Bicycles
- Theft of Building
- Theft of Coin-Operated Machines
- All Other Thefts



VOLUME

The number of thefts committed in McAllen in 2013 was 4652 making this the largest crime category of the Index Crimes. The volume of theft decreased by 2.1 percent when compared to 2012.


More thefts were committed in August and May than any other month. The fewest thefts occurred in October.

RATE

The 2013 Larceny rate was 3355.0 thefts per 100,000 persons.

The change in theft rate from 2012 was a decrease of 4.2%.

It is reasonable to expect that many offenses in this category, particularly where the value of goods stolen is small, are never reported to police agencies.




ANALYSIS

NATURE

The data from the 9 sub-categories of larceny show that the category with the most reported larcenies was the "Shoplifting" with 1618 offenses.

The "Shoplifting" yielded 35% of all thefts, while the theft from "Auto" category closely followed with 27%.

The "All Other Category" accounts for all thefts that did not fit any other category listed in the Uniform Crime Reporting Program. This could include tools, lawn equipment, farm equipment,, etc. (See table: 5)

Property loss is categorized into 10 different subcategories. Of these 10 subcategories, the "Miscellaneous" category accounted for \$ 2,512,279.68, which accounted for most of the monetary loss. Following were the categories of "Jewelry" and "TV/Radios". (See table: 7)

After analyzing all the property index crimes: Burglary, Larceny, and Auto Theft, it can be inferred from the data collected, the highest monetary loss is in Larceny category. See Figure: 35)


Persons Arrested


McAllen Law Enforcement officers made 1125 theft arrests during 2013.

Of the subjects arrested for theft during 2013, 616 were males and 509 were female.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

DEFINITION

Motor vehicle theft is a theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. Motor vehicle includes the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle, which the UCR Program defines as a self-propelled vehicle that runs on land surface and not on rails.

The Category of motor vehicle theft is further sub categorized into three subcategories:

1. Automobiles:

The automobile category includes all sedans, station wagons, coupes, convertibles, and other similar vehicles whose primary purpose is to transport persons from one place to another.


2. Trucks & Buses:

The Truck & Buses category includes vehicles whose purpose is to transport persons for a commercial bases. This includes pick-up trucks, vans, and self propelled motor homes.

3. Other Vehicle Category:

The other vehicle category includes vehicles such as scooters, motorcycles, snowmobiles, mopeds, and golf carts, etc.

Specifically excluded from this category are motor boats, construction equipment, airplanes, and farming equipment.




VOLUME

- During 2013 a total of 236 motor vehicle thefts were reported in the City of McAllen.
- The average monthly motor vehicle theft for 2013 is 19.
- The highest month was January with 29 motor vehicle thefts reported.
- The 2013 motor vehicle theft was 11.8 % greater than 2012.
- The lowest month was in June with 5 motor vehicle thefts reported.


- The motor vehicle theft rate for McAllen in 2013 was 170.2 thefts for 100,000 persons.

ANALYSIS

Nature

Based on the data compiled for 2013, the number of motor vehicles thefts reported in the City if McAllen was 236. The property loss in Motor Vehicle Theft is the second largest reported loss in property for the City of McAllen. The loss is largely due to the value of the vehicles, which is greater than the value of other tangible items reported in the other Property Index crimes .





Of the 236 reported motor vehicle thefts stolen, 40% were trucks and 56% were autos and the remaining 4% were other category. (See figure:37)


Persons Arrested

During 2013, the number of persons arrested for Motor Vehicle Theft was 35. (See figure: 38)

Of those 35 persons arrested for Motor Vehicle Theft, 32 were males 3 were females. (See figure 38.) Furthermore, of those persons 30 were adults and 5 were juveniles. The age 20-24 group was the highest on arrestees.







Chapter Three Selected Non-Index Crimes

There are selected crimes that have been chosen to represent important and essential information with respect to Part II offenses. As with all Part II non-index crimes, information on the number of reported crimes is not collected by the UCR Program for these offenses; however, the number of persons arrested for this crime is collected.

The following are the non-index crimes:

- Driving Under the Influence (DUI) Arrests
- Drug Abuse Arrests
- Drug Seizures
- Weapons Arrests

D.U.I ARRESTS 2013

DEFINITION

For UCR purposes, Driving Under the Influence (D.U.I) is the driving or operating any motor vehicle or common carrier while under the influence of liquor or narcotics. This includes operating a motor vehicle, train, streetcar, boat, etc.

ANALYSIS

Volume

As with Part II non-index crimes, information on the number of reported crimes is not collected by the UCR program for this offense. However, the number of persons arrested for this crime is collected.

The number of arrests for D.U.I in McAllen in 2013 was 734 The volume of arrests decreased by 11 percent in comparison to 2012.

Rate


The 2013 D.U.I. arrest rate was 529.4 per 100,000 persons. When compared to 2012, this was a decrease of 13 percent.


PERSONS ARRESTED

Of the persons arrested in 2013, a total of 734 DUI arrests were accounted for in the City of McAllen. The highest age category on arrests was the 20-24 age group.

DEFINITION


For UCR purposes, drug abuse encompasses all violations of the narcotic drug laws. These are offenses such as unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, and manufacturing of narcotic drugs.


In this report, these violations are summarized to include all drug abuse arrests (grand total drug abuse), sale and manufacturing arrests, and drug possession arrests.


As with all Part II non-index crimes, information on the number of reported crimes is not collected for the UCR program. However, the number of persons arrested for these crimes is collected.

Arrests

The reported number of arrests for possession of drugs in McAllen in 2013 was 499. Of the arrestees, 68 were juveniles and 431 were adults. The age group with the largest number of persons arrested for drug possession violations was the 20-24 year old group. The largest number of possession arrests came from marijuana at 74 percent, followed by opium/cocaine at 25 percent.







DRUG SEIZURE 2013

DEFINITION

Drug seizure information is presented in compliance with Health & Safety Code Section 481.185 and its requirement that "All law enforcement agencies in this state shall file monthly with the (DPS) Director a report of all arrests for drug offenses made and quantities of controlled substances seized by them during the preceding month."

DRUG SEIZURES: TYPE QUANTITY

The chart below displays the quantity of illegal drugs seized in the City of McAllen during 2013. (See table: 8)

Dose units refer to one pill, tablet, capsule, or other single user quantity. The information presented are drugs seized by the McAllen Police Department and do not include drugs seized by any federal law enforcement agency.

WEAPONS ARRESTS 2013

DEFINITION

As with all Part II non-index offenses, the UCR Program collects only reports of arrests for this offense. Weapons by definition is the violation of laws or ordinances "prohibiting the manufacture, sale purchase, transportation, possession, concealment, or use of firearms, cutting instruments, explosives, incendiary devices, or other deadly weapons.

ANALYSIS

As previously indicated in this report, firearms accounted for 35% of all Aggravated Assaults in the City of McAllen.


NATURE

During 2013 the month with the highest number of arrests was in March and August with 6 arrests. (See figure:45)

PERSONS ARRESTED

Of the 22 subjects arrested 20 were males and 2 females were arrested for weapon charges. The largest age group of arrestees for weapon violations was the 25-29 year old group. (See figure: 46)





Chapter Four Family Violence

FAMILY VIOLENCE

DEFINITION

The Texas Family Code defines Family Violence as an Act by a member of a family or household against another member that is intended to result in physical harm, bodily injury, assault, or a threat that reasonably places the member in fear of imminent physical harm.

The Law excludes the reasonable discipline of a child and defines abuse as physical injury that results in substantial harm or genuine threat; sexual contact, intercourse, or conduct; or compelling or encourage the child to engage in sexual conduct.


By definition and for the purpose of family violence reports, "family" includes individuals related by consanguinity (blood) or affinity, marriage or former marriage, biological parents of the same child, foster children, foster parents, and member or former members of the same household (including roommates). Senate Bill 68 of the 77th Legislature amended the Family Code to include "Dating Violence". The "Dating Relationship" means a relationship between individuals who have or have had continuing relationship of romantic or intimate nature.

ANALYSIS

During 2013, the total number of Family Violence incidents reported were 591. Incidents involved victims and 571 offenders.


The most common relationship reported was the "spouse" category.

In family violence the use of personal weapon (strong-arm) accounted for 93 percent



During 2013, there were 591 family violence incidents reported. Of the incidents reported 50 percent accounted for victims and 49 percent were offenders. During 2013, during the course of responding to family violence incidents 7 officers were assaulted.


The victim relationship category with the most was spouse with 178 incidents reported. The second most commonly reported relationship was the common law spouse category with 156. (See figure: 48)




The most common weapon involved in family violence cases was the use of strongarm, which accounted for 93 percent of the incidents reported in 2013.

For purpose of family violence report, the McAllen Police Officers who responded to disturbance calls determined the extent of injuries and all injuries were considered to be apparent injuries. The majority of reported injuries (93%) were considered to be minor injuries .








Chapter Six Law Enforcement Personnel

COMMISSIONED PERSONNEL


The City of McAllen is currently authorized 281 sworn officers, and is at 93 percent of full strength. The average number of officers per 1000 citizens of McAllen is 2.03. Of the current strength 88 percent are male and 12 percent are female.




CIVILIAN PERSONNEL

The Police Department is authorized 138 civilian employees.

The McAllen Police Department employs 138 civilian employees, which include Community Service Specialists, Emergency Communications Specialists, Custodians, Records Clerks, Administrative Assistants, Secretaries, Crime Statistician, Animal Wardens, and Fleet Maintenance Personnel. 133 of the civilian employees are non-exempt, and 5 are exempt employees. Of the civilian employees 45 percent are male and 55 percent are female.

APPENDICES

UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING OFFENSES Part I Offenses

Offenses in Uniform Crime Reporting are divided into two groups designated as Part I and Part II offenses. Offense and arrest information is reported for the Part I offenses, while only arrest information is reported for Part II offenses.

Criminal Homicide – (a) Murder and non-negligent manslaughter: All willful felonious homicides as distinguished from deaths caused by negligence. Excluded are attempts to kill, assaults, to kill, suicides, accidental deaths and justifiable homicides. Justifiable homicides are limited to: the killing of a person by a law enforcement officer in the line of duty; and the killing of a person in the act of committing a felony by a private citizen; (b) Manslaughter by negligence: any death which the police investigation established was primarily attributable to gross negligence of some individual other than the victim.

Murder and Non-Negligent Manslaughter – The willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another. This includes any death due to injuries received in a fight, argument, quarrel, assault, or commission of a crime. Suicides, accidental deaths, assaults to murder, traffic fatalities and attempted murders are not included.

Justifiable Homicide – The killing of a person by a law enforcement officer in the line of duty; or the killing (during the commission of a felony) of a felon by a private citizen.

Manslaughter by Negligence – The killing of another person through gross negligence.

Forcible Rape – The carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will.

Robbery – The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

Aggravated Assault – An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault is usually accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm.

Burglary – The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft. This includes breaking and entering with intent to commit a larceny; housebreaking; safe cracking; and all attempts at these offenses.

Larceny-Theft – The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. This includes pocket-picking, purse-snatching, shoplifting, theft from motor vehicles, theft of motor vehicle parts and accessories, theft of bicycles, theft from buildings, theft from coin-operated machines, and all thefts that don't fit into the above mentioned categories.

Motor Vehicle Theft – The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle, which is defined as a self-propelled vehicle that runs on land surface and not on rails.

Glossary of Terms

Adult – In Texas, an adult is a person 17 years of age or over. National law provides that adults are age 18 or over. Unless otherwise indicated, this publication follows the state definition.

Cleared by Arrest or Exceptional Means – For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, an offense is cleared by arrest or solved when at least one person is arrested, charged with the commission of an offense and turned over to court for prosecution. In certain situations, police are not able to follow these three steps and, if the following four conditions can be met, the offense can be cleared exceptionally: (1) the investigation has definitely established the identity of the offender; (2) there is enough information to support an arrest, charge, and turning over to the court for prosecution; (3) the exact location of the offender is known so that he could be taken into custody; (4) there is some reason outside the police control that prevents the arresting, charging, and prosecuting of the offender.

Crime Index – The sum of seven index offenses used to measure the extent, fluctuation and distribution of a crime in a given geographical area. Crime classifications used in the Crime Index are: murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft. While arson is also an index offense, it is not part of the Crime Index.

Crime Rate – The number of offenses per 100,000 inhabitants. To calculate a crime rate, divide the population by 100,000 and then divide the number of offenses by that answer. The crime rate is useful in determining the relative frequency of crime without regard to fluctuations in population.

Index Crime – A crime for which reports of offenses committed are collected. Index crimes are murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft and arson.

Juvenile – In Texas, a juvenile is a person 16 years of age or under.

Non-Violent Crime – Property crimes; the index offenses of burglary, larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft.

Personal Weapon – The use of hands, feet, fists and teeth as a weapon to commit a crime; also termed strongarm weapon.

Strong-Arm Weapons – The use of hands, feet, fists and teeth as a weapon to commit a crime. Also termed personal weapon.

Threat – A declared intent to inflict bodily harm on a person.

Violent Crime – Consists of the Index Offenses of murder, forcible rape, robbery and aggravated assault. Also referred to as crimes against persons.
